VSEPR theory: limitation and applications, molecular orbital theory, Walsh diagrams (tri-atomic molecules type AH2), $d\pi$ -p π bonds, Bent rule and energetic of hybridization, some simple reactions of covalently bonded molecules, Atomic Inversion, Berry Pseudorotation.

II. Metal – Ligand Equilibria in Solution

Stepwise and overall formation constants and their interaction, trends in stepwise constants, factors affecting the stability of metal complexes with reference to the nature of metal ion and ligand, Chelate effect and its thermodynamic origin, determination of binary formation constants by pH-metry and spectrophotometry.

III. Reaction Mechanism of Transition Metal Complexes

Energy profile of a reaction, reactivity of metal complexes, inert and labile complexes, kinetic application of valence bond and crystal field theories. Kinetics of octahedral substitution. Acid hydrolysis, factors affecting acid hydrolysis, base hydrolysis, conjugate base mechanism, reactions without metal ligand bond cleavage. Substitution reaction in square planer complexes, the trans effect, mechanism of substitution reactions, Mechanism of redox reactions and its application in bioinorganic Chemistry, electron transfer reactions, cross reactions and Marcus-Hush theory..

IV. Metal – Ligand Bonding

Limitations of crystal field theory, molecular orbital theory, octahedral, tetrahedral and square planar complexes, Jahn-Teller effect, π – *bonding* and molecular orbital theory.

V. Electronic Spectra and Magnetic Properties of Transition Metal Complexes 15 Hrs

Spectroscopic ground states, correlation, Orgel and Tanbe-Sugano diagrams for transition metal complexes $(d^1 - d^9 \text{ states})$, calculations of Dq, B and β parameters, charge transfer spectra, spectroscopic method of

I. Nature of Bonding in organic Molecules and reaction mechanism

Delocalized Chemical bonding conjugation, cross conjugations inductive resonance effect, hype conjugation, tautomerism.

Introduction to Aromaticity in benzenoid and non-benzenoid compounds, Three membered, five membered and seven membered compound, alternate and non-alternate hydrocarbon, Huckel's rule, energy level of π molecular orbitals, annulenes, azulenes, anti-aromaticity, Ψ aromaticity, homo-aromaticity, PMO approach for aromaticity.

Bonds weaker then covalent-addition compounds, crown ether complexes and cryptands, inclusion compounds, cyclodextrins, catenanes and rotaxanes.

II. Rection Mechanism : Structure and Reactivity

Type of mechanisms, types of reaction, thermodynamic and kinetic requirements, thermodynamic and kinetic control, Hammond's postulate, Curtin-Hammett principle. Potential energy diagrams, transition states and intermediates, Corboncation, carbon ion, Freeradical, Carbene Nitrenes, Arynes – generation, structure and their stability, methods of determining mechanisms.

III. Aliphatic Nucleophilic Substitution

The S_N^2 , S_N^1 , mixed S_N^1 and S_N^2 and SET mechanisms.

The neighbouring group mechanism, neighbouring group participation by π and σ bonds, anchimeric assistance. Classical and non-classical carbocations, phenonium ions, norbornyl system, common carbocation rearrangements. Application of NMR spectroscopy in the detection of carbocations. The S_N¹ mechanism. Nucleophilic substitution at an allylic, aliphatic trigonal and a vinylic carbon.

IV. Aromatic Nucleophilic substitution

The S_NAr , S_N1 , benzyne and $S_{RN}1$ mechanisms. Reactivity-effect of substrate structure, leaving group and attacking nucleophile. The von – Richter, Sommelet Hauser, and Smiles rearrangement.

V. Aliphatic and aromatic Electrophilic substitution

Bimolecular mechanisms $-S_E^2$ and S_E^1 mechanism, electrophilic substitution accompanied by double bond shifts. Effects of substrates, leaving group and the solvent polarity on the reactivity.

Aromatic Electrophilic substitution : The arenium ion mechanism, orientation and reactivity, energy profile diagrams. The ortho/para ratio, ipso attack, orientation in other ring system. Quantitative treatment of reactivity in substrates and electrophics. Diazonium coupling, Gattermann-Koch reaction.

B. Angular Momentum

C. Electronic Structure of Atoms

Electronic configuration, Russell – Saunders terms and coupling schemes, Slater – Condon parameters, term, separation, energies of the p^n configuration, term separation energies for the d^n configuration, magnetic effects : spin – orbit coupling and Zeeman splitting, introduction to the methods of self – consistent field. The virial theorem.

D. Molecular Orbital Theory

Huckel theory of conjugated systems, bond order and charge density calculations, Application to ethylene, butadiene, cyclopropenyl radical, cyclobutadiene etc. Introduction to extended Huckel theory.

II. Thermodynamics

A. Classical Thermodynamics

Brief resume of concepts of laws of thermodynamics, free energy, chemical potential and entropies. Partial molar properties ; partial molar free energy, partial molar heat content and their significances. Determination of these quantities. Concept of fugacity and determination of fugacity. Non-ideal systems : Excess functions for non-ideal solution. Activity, activity coefficient.

B. Statistics Thermodynamics

Concepts of distribution, Thermodynamic probability and most probable distribution. Ensemble Averaging postulates of ensemble Averaging. Canonical, grand Canonical and microcanonical ensembles, corresponding distribution laws (using Lagrange's method of α , β undetermined multipliers). Partition function – translational, rotational, vibrational and electronic partition functions, calculation of thermodynamic properties in terms of partition functions. Applications of partition functions. Heat capacity behaviour of solids-chemical equilibria and equilibrium constant in terms of partition function, Fermi Dirac statistics – distribution law and applications to metal. Bose – Einstein statistics – distribution law and application to helium.

Breakdown of Oppenheimer approximation; Vibrations of polyatomic molecules. Selection rules, normal modes of Vibration, group frequencies, overtones, hot bands, factors affecting the band positions and intensities, far IR region, metal – ligand vibrations, normal co-ordinate analysis.

B. Raman Spectroscopy

Classical and quantum theories of Raman effect. Pure rotational, vibrational and vibrational rotational Raman spectra, selection rules mutual exclusion principle. Resonance Raman Spectroscopy, Coherent Anti stokes Raman Spectroscopy (CARS).

II. **Electronic Spectroscopy**

A. Atomic Spectroscopy

Energies of atomic orbitals, vector representation of momenta and vector coupling spectra of hydrogen atom and alkali metal atoms.

B. Molecular Spectroscopy

Energy levels, molecular orbitals, vibronic transition, vibrational progressions and geometry of the excited states, Franck – Condon Principle, electronic spectra of polyatomic molecules. Emission spectra; radiative and non-radiative decay, internal conversion, metal complexes, charge – transfer spectra.

Nuclear Magnetic Resonance Spectroscopy III.

Nuclear spin, Nuclear resonance, saturation shielding of magnetic nuclei, chemical shift and its measurement, factors influencing chemical shift, deshielding, spin-spin interaction, factors influencing coupling constant 'J' Classification (ABX, AMX, ABC, A₂B₂ etc.), spin decoupling; basic ideas about instrument, NMR studies of nuclei other than proton - ¹³C, ¹⁹F and ³¹P. FT NMR, advantage of FT NMR, use of NMR in medical diagnostics.

Electron Spin Resonance Spectroscopy IV.

Basic principle, zero field splitting and Kramer's degeneracy, factors affecting the 'g' value. Isotropic and anisotropic hyperfine coupling constants, spin Hamiltonian, spin densities and McConnell relationship measurement techniques, applications.

- Synthesis of benzanilide from benzene (Ref.: ibid. p. 775, 812)
 Aim to carry out Friedal Crafts Acylation (anhydroup conditions) and Beckmann rearrangement.
 Make a comparative study of IR and PMR spectra of benzene, benzophenone, benzophenone oxime and benzanilide (N-H stretching vibration typical of a secondary amide) if possible.
